

Saturday started with an amazing breakfast and the noon meal featured Floyd Lancia the Regional Rotary Foundation Coordinator of Zone 30 who explained how important our contributions to Foundation are. Foundation giving reaching international and local areas in times of need. We focus on the eradication of polio, but were amazed to learn how many other areas are serviced by Rotarians giving of themselves and their money. Chad Anderson, District 6400, the Menghini Scholarship recipient explained his project teaching children and adults songs of awareness to teach how to avoid malaria. He has been offered a Master's Degree program to continue the work and research how the program he has helped develop is working in areas of malaria ridden countries.

Breakout sessions included information about polio immunization, Rotary activities, and Rotary success stories. Rotaract treated us to team-building activities like the ones at RYLA and a photo scavenger hunt. Rotary trivia was held on one of the sessions to test our knowledge of the organization.



Immediate Past District Governor Steve Hopper hosted the Governor awards. District Governor Nominee Brian Barstead led the beautiful memorial service honoring those Rotarians who have passed since the last District Conference. The final general assembly session concluded the conference with a business meeting to elect new officers and we concluded with the most exciting part of the day...the drawing for the 10 for 10 contest. The Rotary Club of Bushnell had at least 10% of their club in attendance along with 11 other clubs but Bushnell was drawn for a check for \$10,000 to use for a service project of their choice. I enjoyed surprising them at their meeting on Halloween to present them with the check.

I know many of you are waiting for the reveal of the special guest who was at the conference, and if you were not there you missed one of the cleverest, funny, and inspiring guests at the conference – Paul P. Harris. Paul found himself inside a time machine, which he thought was an elevator and was transported to the Rotary District Conference (with a little help from Allen Stare). Keith Lape Awarded the RI Foundation Distinguished Service Award

Dr. Keith R. Lape, a member of the Jacksonville Rotary Club, was recently awarded the Rotary International Foundation Distinguished Service Award. In presenting the award, Rotary District 6460's District Governor, Tony Williams said, "I can't imagine anyone more deserving of this prestigious award than Keith. He has always represented Rotary at its highest level, as a Rotarian and Past District Governor."



The Distinguished Service Award is an international award that is granted annually to a maximum of 50 Rotarians worldwide. Only one Rotarian may be selected from each of the 352 Districts in the world each year. These Rotarians must have exhibited exceptional active service to The Rotary Foundation. To qualify, the nominee must have demonstrated a broad range of service over an extended period of time with substantial activity in the past two years, in addition to having met other criteria. Recipients must also have received the Rotary International Foundation Meritorious Service Award at least four years previously. Only two Rotarians have previously received the Distinguished Service Award from

District 6460, the west central Illinois district in which the Jacksonville club is located.

Lape served as District Governor of Rotary District 6460 in 2005-2006. He has also served as Foundation Chair of the District and chaired many Rotary International Foundation committees. Lape has traveled twice to Mexico with the Rotary Heart of America delegations to observe grants sponsored by Rotary and to help select grant recipients for future years. Lape and his wife, Phyllis, have attended eight Rotary International Conventions throughout the world.

Lape's nomination was endorsed by District Governor Tony Williams as well as two other Rotarians, one of whom was from another Rotary District. Williams presented the award to Lape at the Rotary District 6460 conference in Springfield in mid-October.

Ron Riggins Awarded the RI Citation for Meritorious Service

Ron Riggins, a member of the Rotary Club of Peoria North, was recently awarded the Rotary International Citation for Meritorious Service.

The Citation for Meritorious Service recognizes individual Rotarians who have demonstrated outstanding active service to The Rotary Foundation for more than one year. Examples of eligible service include, but are not limited to:

- Service on Foundation committees at the club, district, or international level
- Participation in Foundation grants or programs
- Support of Ambassadorial Scholars, Rotary Peace Fellows, Group Study Exchange teams, or vocational training teams

Financial contributions to the Foundation, however notable, are not relevant considerations for this award. An individual may receive this award only once. Any active Rotarian in good standing may be nominated, with the exception of current and incoming District Governors, current and incoming RI Directors, and current Foundation Trustees. Ron's nomination was endorsed by the District Governor. Each district may have only one recipient per year. Congratulations, Ron, for a job well done!

Mark Roberts Confirmed as District Governor Nominee Designate



From there, Rotarians were treated to a variety of fun and engaging programming, including breakout sessions on grant projects, small group discussion of Rotary's youth programs, and even a selfie scavenger hunt (won by the Rotary Club of Pittsfield).



Friday evening began with a service project that benefited six different agencies of the Prairieland United Way and then transitioned into a progressive networking dinner. Saturday saw a presentation by Regional Rotary Foundation Coordinator Floyd Lancia, followed by a Rotary Foundation update from District Rotary Foundation Chair Mark Roberts and a variety of awards acknowledging outstanding performance by Rotarians and Rotary clubs over the past year. Of course, all eyes were on the closing session, where twelve clubs who had over 10% of their membership in attendance at the Conference were entered into the "10 for 10" drawing for an opportunity to win \$10,000.00 for community service projects. Ultimately, the Rotary Club of Bushnell, represented by President Sirina Waddell, had their name drawn and went home with the big check.



District Conference was well-received by all in attendance, and the event will be even bigger and better next year, as it will be held in conjunction with the Rotary Zones 30 and 31 Institute in Springfield during the weekend of September 8.

SISTERCLUB TWINNING/MATCHED CLUB AGREEMENT

In the mutual desire to promote international goodwill and friendship and further strengthen fellowship and acquaintance in pursuit of the ideals and objectives of Rotary International, the following:

**ROTARY CLUB OF ALEDO
R.I. DISTRICT 6460
ILLINOIS, USA**

Hereby agree to enter a Twinning/Matched Club Agreement through the respective sanctions of all the directors and Rotarians of both clubs and in accordance with the elemental spirit of existing Rotary International rules and regulations.

The objectives of this Twinning/Matched Club relation are, as follows:

1. To develop and promote friendship and mutual understanding between the two Rotary International District in general, and the two Rotary Clubs in particular;
2. To encourage and organize the exchange of visits either as a group or as individuals from both clubs;
3. To assist Rotarians and their family members to contact and to correspond between each other, especially those with the same classification, profession, occupation, business or vocation;
4. To foster fellowship and service through vocational contact, meetings and related friendly activities;
5. To undertake joint service projects, whenever possible, for the benefit of the community in either districts;
6. To mutually assist members in the two clubs by combining their individual talents and commitment to service and to initiate steps to strengthen the future of Rotary and the generations which it will continue to serve;
7. This Agreement does not deprive each Club the right of establishing similar friendly relations with other Rotary clubs in their respective districts, with the knowledge and consent of their respective District Governors.

Page 2 of Sister club Agreement

The relations shall take effect immediate upon the signing of this Agreement by the duly authorized officers of both clubs and shall remain in force until 30 June 2017.

This Agreement is subject to renewal by mutual consent in writing by both Clubs on or before the expiry date.

Club Grants – The Rotary Foundation Working in Your Community

Every year, Rotary Clubs in District 6460 may apply for Club Grants of up to \$2,000.00 for the purpose of carrying out a service project in their communities. The funding for these grants comes from contributions to the Rotary Foundation, which are returned to our District and made available to our local clubs.

This year, nineteen clubs received some form of support for their grant projects, and the funds awarded totaled \$28,765.00. The clubs' projects are currently being implemented throughout the District, and they are excellent examples of the diverse ways in which Rotary clubs seek to make the world a better place.

Parks are often beneficiaries of Club Grant funds, and this year is no exception. The Rotary Club of Carlinville will be using its grant funds to install a "rain garden" at a local park to alleviate flooding, which the Rotary Club of East Peoria will be providing benches for a "reading garden" in their park. Youth sports programs are another popular recipient of funding, with the Rotary Club of Highland providing new backboards for a basketball program, the Rotary Club of Pittsfield erecting a storage shed for a swim team, and Rotary Club of the Riverbend making several improvements to a Special Olympic baseball field.

The Rotary Clubs of Monmouth, Springfield Midtown, and Springfield Sunrise will be benefiting schools in their area, with Monmouth providing food to underprivileged students, Springfield Midtown funding a "Girls on the Run" curriculum for a junior high school, and Springfield Sunrise providing tables and flags to an elementary school in need.

The Rotary Clubs of Jerseyville and Bushnell will also be focusing on education, though in different settings. Bushnell's project sees them providing equipment to a facility that gives job training to individuals with developmental disabilities, while Jerseyville will be supplying its public library with a "smart TV" that will assist in a variety of educational programming, some of which will be hosted by Rotarians.

Two projects this year involve two Rotary clubs in the same town partnering to carry out a common goal. In Galesburg, the noon and sunrise clubs each wrote grants to construct little free libraries throughout the city. Meanwhile, in Macomb, the noon and morning clubs each received their own funding to upgrade different components of the same area homeless shelter.

The Rotary Clubs of Springfield, Springfield South, and Rushville are also getting in on the giving spirit of grants. Respectively, their projects involve providing Christmas food baskets to needy families, performing landscaping work at a home for foster families, and outfitting first responders with voltage detectors for addressing emergencies involving downed power lines.

Finally, two clubs have proved that the relatively small club grants can make a difference outside of our country. The Metro East Community Rotary Club will be partnering with a school in Haiti to furnish necessary books and workbooks, while the Rotary Club of Jacksonville will be preparing holiday care packages for U.S. service members overseas.

Overall, Club Grants remain an excellent way to put Rotary Foundation dollars to work in your own backyard. Though grants are no longer available for the current Rotary year, training to receive grants for 2017-2018 will begin after January 1.
