reaching down to the youth and inspiring them to follow the premises of the 4 Way Test in ages 12-18 in Interact Clubs and college-aged young people can find leadership and service projects in Rotaract. Herbert John Taylor, in 1932 crafted the 4 Way Test, but he also championed the code, as the 44th Rotary International President, by asking Rotarians “to apply the 4 Way Test to our relations with youth.” Rotary International has programs available we can use to take into the classroom and put our creed to work shaping lives in young people who seem to have no direction. The precepts of our motto serve us well in business, friendships, and all relationships – why would we want to keep that to ourselves? John Germ, at the International Assembly last year, urged the new District Governors to focus on Foundation giving and youth programs to make opportunities to make things better for the young people of our world. Before I become IPDG (doesn't that sound nice?), I want to leave you with a request to look into your school district, recreation district, or community centers. Ask if you can start an Interact club and start with a few students. Teach them to measure their actions by the 4 Way Test. Guide them by example and make their service projects fun. ### May 4, 2017 Club Program

Dana Murphy, Executive Director of Aledo Main Street was introduced as the program at the May 4<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Aledo Rotary Club.

Aledo Main Street is a non-profit organization that focuses on the comprehensive strategy to commercial district revitalization. The group looks for ways to promote the community, businesses and encourage visitors to come to Aledo and see what sets us apart.

The group consists of various committees that have numerous volunteers to help create streetscapes, events and general excitement for our business community. The street corners are changed out each season to create an inviting atmosphere to coincide with the events that are planned during the year.

There is also participation with the business community in a Scholarship program with the local School District to give away three \$600.00 Scholarships to participating students.

Aledo Main Street has an active role in the Rhubarb Festival that brings around 10,000 visitors to the community in early June. They also host three summer free movies in the park, along with a Farmer's Market and a Bake Sale from June to October. In late August, the annual Antique Day's Festival and Knuckle Busters Car Show are hosted. In December, the group hosts the annual Holly Day's event along with an Electric Parade and Hot Chocolate Hustle 5K run.



Each of these events are in beautiful Historic Downtown Aledo and along with the opportunity to shop our local businesses, there are also various vendors set up. There are many other activities that are going at all times to keep the community involved. The Aledo Main Street Group is always looking for new partnerships and ideas to keep the community thriving.

**June 8, 2017 Club Program**

Erin Knackstedt, the Aledo City Administrator, was introduced as the program for June 8<sup>th</sup>.

Erin grew up in Geneseo, IL. After graduating high school, she received my BA in History from Northern Illinois University (NIU) and took a Fall internship on Capitol Hill in Washington, DC with Speaker Hastert's office.

She was accepted into the Masters of History program at DePaul University in 2010 and moved to Chicago. During the completion of her Master's degree, she and her husband I moved to the suburbs, had two children, and I worked full-time for the Village of Villa Park directly under the Village Manager



After completing her Master's degree, she decided that she would like to further my career in local government and completed the Certificate of Public Administration at Northern Illinois University.

She applied with and was hired by the City of Aledo in July 2016. Erin and he are enjoying the community and look forward to the future.

The City of Aledo has a lot of exciting things going on. There is a continued effort to encourage growth in the downtown area and this Fall the City will partner with Aledo Main Street to offer an Aledo Business Bootcamp. This program is designed for both new and existing businesses to participate with the goal of expanding or creating a new business downtown.

The downtown area has experienced the completion of another phase of our downtown improvement plan and it looks beautiful! The City will also see the completion of asphalt improvements in the southeast quadrant, re-asphalt of the parking by the courthouse, and the completion of parking areas by Monument Park.

# Galesburg Rotary Park Renovation (Rotary Clubs of Galesburg and Galesburg Sunrise)

Don't you just love it when a plan comes together? It took seven years for a plan to come together for the Rotary Clubs and the Pilot Club of Galesburg, Illinois, but it happened!

The Pilot Club wanted to build a handicapped accessible spray pad and the Rotary Club of Galesburg wanted to build a restroom facility to commemorate their 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and the Rotary Club of Galesburg Sunrise wanted to build a community walking path. The perfect location was Rotary Park in Galesburg which was in need of upgrading.



Through a community wide solicitation and a match provided by the State of Illinois, \$670,000.00 worth of upgrades were added to Rotary Park.



All of the money raised for this matching project was raised primarily by Rotarians with no help from Rotary District or Rotary International. This project spanned seven years with a three-year pledge solicitation and a two-year hiatus due to Illinois budgetary constraints.

The ribbon cutting ceremony was held on June 17, 2017. After a brief program of welcome, participants held a parade complete with Club banners to celebrate the formal opening of the park.

4. Dictionary projects will not be accepted by the committee, but they are considered the least likely project to be funded and will be funded only if money is available after all other grants are rated.
5. The grant project should not include money for food or snacks.

The Literacy Grant money is funded through “**Rotary Family Day at the Ballpark.**” Therefore, clubs selling baseball tickets will have a higher priority for funding. **ALL** clubs are eligible for funding. Applying for Literacy Grant money does not guarantee approval for funding.

## Rotary Literacy Grant Information Page (Do not send)

### Evaluation criteria:

1. The chair will make sure all applications are complete and will notify grant contact person if any information is missing
2. Upon receiving applications, committee members will review and rate each application
3. After rating, a composition number will be totaled
4. Clubs receiving highest totals will receive grants, based on money available
5. Each Rotary Club submitting grants will receive notification of the status of the grants.

### Points to be considered when reviewing applications:

1. The extent and quality of the literacy project as indicated in the grant description
2. Number of people directly affected by the project
3. Opportunities for literacy improvement through the grant proposal
4. Financial need for the project. Will the project take place without grant money?
5. Organizational collaboration (Partnership with another entity, such as a school, a business, or another professional granting agency)
6. Need in the community for the proposed literacy project
7. Is the literacy project unique or innovative?
8. Overall merit of the project

\* \* \* \* \*

Although Literacy Grant proposals will be accepted from all clubs throughout the District, the Literacy committee will rate all projects according to project quality. The committee will determine if the project can be completed. A rating chart summary will be available for all clubs, if interested. Dictionary projects will not be accepted by the committee, but they are considered the least likely project to be funded and will be funded only if money is available after all other grants are rated. As stated above, the committee will give merit to those clubs participating in sales of baseball tickets.



## A SONG TO FIGHT MALARIA

**Chad Anderson, an ambassadorial scholar hosted by the Rotary Club of Pretoria Hatfield (D9400), is a Master in Public Health (MPH) student at the School of Health Systems and Public Health (SHSPH) of the University of Pretoria (UP). For almost five years, he has been working on malaria education and health promotion.**

Formerly from Central Illinois, USA, Chad first came to Africa as a Peace Corp volunteer in 2011 and served in Mali and Botswana for several years. He was awarded a Rotary Scholarship which enabled him to enroll at UP.

During his time in Botswana, Chad developed a rap video on malaria and his Master's dissertation is focused on malaria prevention by teaching young children to sing about ways to prevent malaria. Inspired by the rap song he wrote in Botswana, Chad decided to add a scientific research method to see if the song could be used to prevent malaria.

The song focuses on children under five years old in

rural South Africa. It teaches them what malaria is, how it is spread, the symptoms and most importantly, what they can do to prevent getting sick.

In Chad's research project, educators, parents and experts in the field of malaria, education, and music helped shape the song. The first step was to select ten experts (four malaria, three music and three education experts) to participate in a survey to determine the appropriateness of the song.

The experts were met individually and their answers were used to determine where the song needed to be edited. This was repeated until all experts came to an agreement on all 10 questions.

After the experts gave their approval the community was approached. Two separate focus groups were conducted in the study area which gave feedback on word changes and additional messages they felt needed to be in the song. Interestingly, both focus groups felt the song would work.

Please follow up if you have an email from me or Pete Caruso. The Preliminary Ap is at the bottom. You need to interview your interested student and then forward to me and Pete. District Interviews are Sept 9.

**#2 Inbound Commitments need to come to me prior to July 1 for 2018 Inbounds.** I'll email you the form.

## How to Host an Inbound Student

**Step One:** email [Barbmalany@yahoo.com](mailto:Barbmalany@yahoo.com) to request a Commitment Form requesting to host;

**Step Two:** Appoint a YEO, Get permission from your High School, Find your first host family. Host family does not have to be a Rotarian.

**Step Three:** Your \*YEO gets tested, listed with Dept of State, becomes one of the elite of YE.

**Step Four:** Your Host Family fills out an application, gets trained, starts emailing Inbound.

**Step Five:** Rotary Club enjoys the benefits of Youth Exchange.

**Cost:** \$3,000-\$3500 for the Inbound year, usually August – July. (Club pays for allowance, lunch, transportation to Fun Weekends, school supplies, an administrative fee of \$1,000 to cover Central States membership, attendance for Grand Rapids, Fun Weekends.)

## How to Sponsor an Exchange Student

**Club Step One:** Send 2 sophomores to RYLA where they meet Inbound Exchange Students and learn about Rotary Youth Exchange and Interact. (April)

**Step Two:** Follow up on any inquiries of students 15.5-18.5 years old who wish to experience high school in another country. This opportunity is a scholarship sponsored by Rotary & qualifies for D Funds. The student pays for the flight, visa, passport.

**Step Three:** Student fills out Preliminary Application, gives to club. Club interviews student.

**Step Four:** Application is forwarded to Pete Caruso, Outbound Coordinator

**Step Five:** Club appoints a YEO to help usher the student and parents through the year long process.

**Cost:** Club Commitment fee of \$700 which includes administrative costs, membership in Central States Youth Exchange, payable in March of the exchange year.
