Today is Pearl Harbor Day. I don't think we have too many members left, unfortunately, who served during that war, but if you have one in your family or your memory, we owe them everything.



In talking to Rotarians this time of year, I know that you're all busy people. This is a big time of year for get togethers, fundraising and service projects. It's wonderful seeing how many of you also are helping other local service organizations, particularly the Salvation Army, this time of year. I haven't done my bucket duty this year, but I enjoy standing outside in the sleet ringing a bell once in a while. The town is working hard to get back on its feet and I know it will do so. Locally, some Springfield Rotarians have asked how we might help, and I'm going to see if we can work on something. It gets a little tricky, because Christian County is technically in our neighboring District, Taylorville used to have a Rotary, but there are no Rotary clubs in Christian County currently. I plan to contact my District Governor friend in District 6490, next door, to see if we might be able to do something. Perhaps we'll do some fundraising and donations to help a project down there. I'LL KEEP YOU POSTED.

One thing I love about Rotary is that it is open for anyone, regardless of their religion, politics, gender, race, education level or profession. This is a time of year where many religions celebrate the season. It's also a time of year when we can enjoy the entertainment of movies and music, mostly with a Christmas theme. Most of the popular Holiday Classic movies don't get into the religious side of the Christmas Story as much as the festive side of the story, Ho Ho Ho, Mistletoe, etc.

I've been thinking about one of those movies a lot in my travels to the towns in our District this year—Frank Capra's classic, *It's a Wonderful Life*. In the movie, Jimmy Stewart portrays George Bailey, a local business man who inherits a struggling family business (The Bailey Building and Loan), from his father and is forced to run the business while his younger brother becomes a war hero. Over the years, George resents the business and his life, and has a crisis where he becomes suicidal and wishes he'd never been born. A guardian angel comes to visit and uses that wish to show George what life would've been like if he'd gotten that wish. The whole experience shows George that he, indeed, made a difference and had, in fact, led a wonderful life.

Some of the small towns in Western Illinois reminded me of Bedford Falls in the movie, and I thought there was a metaphor here that I could apply to Rotary. Trying not to plagiarize, I googled it, and indeed found another article written by a PDG on the same subject, so I'm not going to take credit for the original idea, but I'm going to spin the subject my own way.

In my presentation to the clubs, in most of the talks I've discussed the uniqueness of our district, in that we are the home area of one of the first four Rotarians, Gus Loehr – a Carlinville resident, who was one of the first four Rotarians at the first meeting, but also the first person to leave a Rotary club. I read a little about Mr. Loehr in Paul Harris' book, *The Rotarian Age*, where not much is said about him. I visited his grave when I visited Carlinville in October and one of the local club members told me that legend has it that he was perhaps a surly fellow. Having seen Rotary grow quite rapidly during the remainder of his life, it makes me wonder if he might have been angry that he hadn't stayed in the club longer... and that made me sad. So I paid my respects to him.

The message in *It's a Wonderful Life* is that no one is a failure who has friends, and that we all make a difference in our lives. I thought about Mr. Loehr often, and wondered if he hadn't been there to say yes to coming to that first Rotary meeting, would Rotary have even happened (maybe the other guys would have done other things that day in February 1905, and nothing would have come of it)?

Rotary is not mentioned in the movie, but I wonder what might have been if George Bailey had been in the Bedford Falls Rotary. I also wonder what Mr. Potter would have been like if he'd been a Rotarian; then again, Naah, that would have caused too much fuss.

Tee this topic up for discussion at a future club meeting, ask your members to take out a sheet of paper and write answers to the following:

1. What does your Rotary club provide for your community?
2. What would your community be like if your Rotary club had never existed?
3. What would your life be like if you'd not been invited to join your Rotary club?
4. What would the world have been like if Rotary had never happened? Then have a discussion about it.

Through Rotary, you have helped many millions of people have more wonderful and productive lives—some people you'll never meet.

Rotary has definitely helped me have a more wonderful life. I believe in Clarence the Angel and that no person is a failure who has friends, and that very time you hear a bell an angel gets his or her wings.

Peace on Earth, Goodwill toward Men (and women and children). That's what Rotary is all about, Charlie Brown.

Happy Holidays, and thanks for the gift you've given me this year to be your governor.

It's like inviting your friends into your home to meet your family. It's pretty simple. We're going to be providing additional training on Membership Engagement next year, but it's not rocket science.

If you know a Rotarian in your club who can't make your club work out in his or her life, let's work to get our clubs to bend a little, or else help them find another Rotary club that works better, anywhere they belong. Let's grow Rotary, not just our own club.

Try not to rationalize why someone wouldn't want to belong to Rotary- You Invite, they decide. Give the gift of Rotary to your best friend in 2019.

Heart 2 Heart Programs Touch One's Heart

While spending a week in Mexico City with 41 other Rotarians involved with Heart 2 Heart (H2H) from our Zones 30-31 I had two recurring thoughts. First, I am very grateful for the blessings that we enjoy in the U.S.A. and secondly, I am totally impressed with the work being accomplished in Mexico City through Rotary! The Heart 2 Heart Program is a cooperative effort between Rotarians primarily in the "Heart of America" (Zones 30 and 31) and in the "Heart of Mexico" (Districts 4170 and 4140) and The Rotary Foundation to provide humanitarian service, primarily through matching grant projects. The program began in 2004 and has grown significantly since then.

If you would like, I am willing to present a program to your Club about my experiences.

As usual, one of the most touching visits we had was with the kidney transplant recipients and donors. Our own Carlinville Rotary Club is the sponsor of a Global Grant that will keep this marvelous project going. When you hear several patients say that they have two birthdays, one their actual birthday and the other the day they received a new life, it makes a lifelong impression.

Another meaningful visit was to a hospital that serves patients who have been abandoned with chronic or terminal illnesses. The hospital accepts patients of all ages and actually cares for them for the rest of their lives! A list of their needs is developed. You would not believe the condition of one of the ambulances we observed.

Last year we visited a small town named Joquicingo that had lost 25 homes in a September 2017 earthquake. This year we revisited this community and saw two prototype low cost shelters of which the design will be included in an upcoming Global Grant application.

In addition, we visited several schools. In one school badly-needed improvements to the bathrooms were underway. We heard requests for improvements to an auditorium as part of a comprehensive, multi-phase plan, improvements to a fifty year-year chemistry lab, and also improvements to a "Multiple Assistance Center" serving students with Down's Syndrome as well as others with motor skill and auditory issues.

On the Saturday of our visit, we attended District 4170's monthly breakfast. About 250 Rotarians were in attendance! The theme that day was, "Women in Rotary." The presentations and musical entertainment were outstanding. Later that day we received an update of all the current projects underway in H2H and also heard proposals to consider for future projects.

The ten (10) Global Grant projects of the H2H partners for the 2018-2019 Rotary year exceed \$800,000. Several non-global grant projects are also underway.
