





Another idea might be to check with schools for opportunities to provide volunteer time as they are being tasked with many challenges on a limited budget. Those are just some brief ideas, but I know within our district, we have some truly creative people and welcome you to share your projects and fundraising to our newsletter and the district stories. You can also find ideas for your club through Rotary.org by going under the "Get Involved" tab and clicking on "Explore Projects". That allows you to tap into the creativity from Rotarians worldwide and utilize ideas while adapting them to your community needs.

I challenge each club to provide service opportunities and keep their members engaged. Rotary Foundation Update for District 6460

At this point, we have committed most of this year's District Grant of over \$55,000. 15 clubs applied and were approved for Grants to help with their projects and one club is making some changes to its grant request so it should be approved soon, but not in time for this update. Nearly \$40,000 of our Grant money will go to Club Grants this year. We also were able to provide \$3,000 to five worthy college students from the area who were interviewed in July by our District Scholarship Committee. Nice going!

Now is the time to begin thinking about how your club might want to apply and use some of the District Grant Funds available again at this time next year. You might also want to look for great young scholar in your area who could use some scholarship funding for their collegiate efforts. Grant applications are due in August next year. Don't wait until July to begin planning your grant request. Start now!

We should have more money available next year and the year after that, because of your generosity in funding the Annual Fund of The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International (TRF) between 2018-2020. This is where money comes from for our annual grants and scholarships- money you contribute this Rotary year will determine what we get to distribute three years hence.

Just think of what we could do if Every Rotarian in our District donated money Every Year? At least \$25 to \$100 from every Rotarian would really make a difference. We had a good year last year. Last year we had 70 Rotarians who gave at least \$1,000 to TRF. That was 14 more than the previous year. We had 498 Rotarians who gave at least \$100, which was up 18 from the previous year, but we had a decline from 850 to 602 among Rotarians who gave at least \$25 and less than \$100. I understand that the economic conditions might have had some effect on giving last year and this year- but when you consider organizations to whom you can contribute to make a difference, please think of TRF as the partner that helps you, personally, be a part of the endeavors of all the Rotary clubs everywhere. Surely all of us can come up with 27 cents* per day to give to our Rotary movement. If we did that, we'd have double the amount of money to help your clubs achieve their goals.

- 27 cents per day multiplied by 365 days in a year - \$100 – voila, you're at least a Sustaining Member! You probably have 27 cents in between the cushions of your couch. Everyone in my club has done this since 2014- It's not that hard.

Fun with Paul Harris Points

There seems to be a big mystery about how Paul Harris Recognition Points work. In 1957, TRF established the Paul Harris Fellow recognition as a way for clubs to recognize anyone you want by contributing \$1000 to TRF. Since 1957, millions of people have been recognized as Paul Harris Fellows, many of whom are non-Rotarians. The points program is a more recent idea. When you or your club donates money to TRF, you also accumulate Recognition Points, which you can transfer to someone (Rotarian or not). If you transfer at least 1000 points, or if your points which you transfer allow the transferee – added to his or her lifetime contribution totals—brings that person above \$1000 in total giving – the transferee becomes a Paul Harris Fellow. One of the Rotarians in my club recently donated her points to recognize a local community business leader at our club's meeting. The recipient works hard to help small downtown business owners and has helped shepherd them through the COVID nightmare. She was very moved and appreciative of our club's recognition of her efforts. She promised to join our club at a time where her schedule might allow.

I've recognized my wife; my best friend who is a local broadcaster and supporter of youth sports; my golf buddy who is a scratch bowler – long time Jazz DJ – pianist and great pool shooter – who is also blind; the son of one of my club's members who helps us on civic projects before he was an outbound RI Exchange student; and several of my fellow Rotarians who gave annually to TRF- just so they'd get to PHF sooner. It's fun to honor people this way, and it doesn't take away from your own recognition or lifetime donor totals.

A lot of you have built up serious points' in your Donor accounts. Why not use the points to recognize someone in your community or your family who inspired you or who makes a difference for others? It can be a wonderful moment in a club meeting to invite someone and make a presentation like this.

To find out your own Donor Recognition level, go to rotary.org, log into My Rotary (if you haven't done that before, you need to register, which takes a minute), then go to The Rotary Foundation tab, and click Rotary Foundation Reports . Under Individual Reports you'll see a section called Contributions & Recognition and you'll see "Donor History Report", click the link that says "View Report" to view your contribution history and your available Foundation Recognition Points for transfer.


Make donations, then use your points. A Paul Harris Fellow award makes a great stocking stuffer. It builds goodwill and better friendships and is beneficial to all concerned.


Club News and Events – Creating ezStories in DACdb

I have been receiving requests concerning adding news stories to the District Website. Here are some tips on HOW TO DO THIS. This is a Quick Start Tutorial for simple posting of stories with only one photo. I am currently working on full documentation of ezStories and send to the clubs at a later date.


First ... Logon to DACdb, and click on “MyCLUB” and Click on Club ezStory




Next ... Click on "Add Story" in the upper right




Next ... begin filling out the information concerning the story ... The Name of the Story. Select "Draft if you are not ready to publish. Select "Publish" if you are ready to publish after completing the story and saving it. Select the start and end dates that you want the story to be visible. For "Story Image" ... Choose a file from your computer that you want to be visible at the start of the story. For "By-Line" ... Select your or the author's name. Then Click "Story Content"



Type the story into the “summary” area of the window. After complete ... click “SAVE” in the upper right to save the story.



IF you want to shar the story with the District for the District Website Click on “Information” Tab, (see above) and then Click “Share” in the upper right (See Below):



Next, in the dialog box that will appear, choose “Copy” the story to the District, and then click “Save”.




Also, of note is that the book includes an introduction by 6460 Past District Governor, Tony Williams.


